Cordonston: Since 1917



213 Kinzie Avenue

The Arts & Crafts bungalow at 213 Kinzie was built in 1923 by Frank and Lucille Huff. They had previously lived in Parkside and Ardsley Park, but on a visit to Frank's family in Greenville, SC, Lucille spotted a neighbor's house that exactly fit her dreams.

When they returned to Savannah, they purchased the plot in Gordonston, built the house copied from what they had seen in Greenville, and moved in with their three daughters. Their fourth daughter, Cilie, was born there in 1925.

While Cilie was growing up, neighborhood children walked downtown for doughnuts or over to the Dairy Farm for ice cream. During the Depression, the WPA sent a man around on a weekly schedule to organize games for the kids in the Park -- but it was mostly baseball, and mostly for boys. Cilie moved when she married Bill Sutton, but her friendships and connections to Gordonston have been lifelong.

For the past 15 years, Ben Adams has owned 213 Kinzie. He has enjoyed working on the house and garden. At some point, lane access to 213 in the rear was closed off, leaving the garage stranded; Ben transformed it into a garden gazebo. One of his special pleasures has been opening the house to architectural tours. It was included as one of five homes in a tour Ben organized for a museum group from Athens, Ga. More recently, he worked with neighbor Tania Sammons on a tour of five Gordonston homes for the Telfair.

3 Pierpont Circle

I'm the proud second owner of my home at 3 Pierpont Circle. This Savannah Grey Brick "Monterey style" house was designed in 1947 by architect John C. LeBey and built in 1948 by Will Artley Jr. The Artley family had moved to Savannah in 1901 from Williamsport, PA and brought with them extensive building experience.

From the 1930s to the 1960s, the A.A. Artley Co., located on Bay Street, specialized in such local commercial construction as the Bull Street Library, the DeSoto Hotel on Wilmington Island, the First Christian Church (corner of Victory and Atlantic) and renovation projects such as the Dock Street Theater in Charleston.

Upon his return from service WWII, Will Artley built the home for his bride and childhood sweetheart Margaret Devereaux. Together they were gracious entertainers, and the home was a center of the vibrant Gordonston social scene. Their beloved daughter Dorothy "Dottie" Daniels (now of Goebel Avenue) grew up with wonderful memories of watching many cocktail parties and hiding under the dining room table while the adults socialized around her.

The house may look older than its 70 years and with good reason. It was built using recycled—and sometimes historic—materials salvaged by Artley Construction. The wide heart pine interior floors and much of the wood trim were salvaged from now-demolished historic properties. The brick exterior had been recycled as well. The wrought iron fencing in the back yard came from Laurel Grove Cemetery. This is a wonderfully built, comfortable and gracious house thanks to Will and Margaret Artley.
