In Memoriam

Gordonston recently lost three of its long time residents.

Annie Coats Jackson was born in 1934 in Wheeler County, Georgia. She earned multiple degrees from Albany State, Atlanta University, University of Michigan, and Georgia Southern. She taught for many years in the local Savannah school system and was active in numerous professional, social and civic organizations. Mrs. Jackson lived in Gordonston on Kinzie and Atkinson Avenue. Family members have requested donations to the memorial scholarship fund in her name, care of 102 Atkinson Ave. Martha "Betty" Smith was born and lived in Savannah her entire life. She attended Armstrong Junior College, as it was called then. She worked at Great Dane Trailers for 44 years before retiring to her house on Kinzie Avenue. Neighbors remembered her green thumb by



planting a tree in Juliette Low Park (read more about that in the Garden Club News).

Alice Roberts Blank, resident of Gordonston since 1939, passed away at the age of 99. She was born in Savannah in 1915 and graduated with a fine arts degree from the College of William & Mary. She returned to marry Clyde Blank and the couple built their home on Kentucky Avenue, and she continued to pursue her art. She was interviewed in the winter 2011 newsletter by Julia Williams and Judi Painter. From that article: *Her paintings are in private collections across the US as well as in family members' homes. One large abstract painting titled "Strata" hangs over the sofa; it has won awards in five cities, quite an accomplishment for any artist. The Telfair Museum has two of Alice's works in its permanent collection. Though she was largely homebound in her final years, she remained a vibrant neighbor.*
